WHEREAS, Toi Derricotte has built a prestigious career as a world renowned poet, having begun writing and publishing her work for nearly 50 years, drawing substantial attention to African American poetry and prose in the process; and

WHEREAS, she has received great acclaim for her works, including
The Empress of the Death House (1978)
Natural Birth (1983)
Captivity (1989), which received the Columbia Book Award from the Poetry Committee of the Greater Washington D.C. area
The Black Notebooks: An Interior Journey (1997), a *New York Times* “Notable Book”
Tender (1997), winner of the 1998 Paterson Poetry Prize
and her newest collection, *The Undertaker's Daughter* (2011); and

WHEREAS, numerous awards have been bestowed upon these works including the Barnes & Noble Writers for Writers Award from Poets & Writers, Inc., the Distinguished Alumni Award from New York University, the Lucille Medwick Memorial Award from the Poetry Society of America, two Pushcart Prizes, fellowships from the Rockefeller Foundation, the Guggenheim Foundation, and two from the National Endowment for the Arts, and the 2012 PEN/Voelcker Award for Poetry; and

WHEREAS, she has additionally built a substantial academic career, having inspired young creative writers for more than 20 years at the University of Pittsburgh, where she is currently a professor of English; and

WHEREAS, she is the co-founder of the Cave Canem Foundation, a home for the many voices of African American poetry committed to cultivating the artistic and professional growth of African American poets.
