**Whereas**, on January 3, 1859, the Episcopal Church Home opened as an "asylum for the aged, infirmed, and helpless;" and,

**Whereas**, the Episcopal Church Home moved from its original site near the Point to its present location in Lawrenceville in April of 1861; and,

**Whereas**, it has served disadvantaged members of the community continuously since its opening, at one time providing support to Civil War orphans and later to seniors and the disabled; and,

**Whereas**, the Episcopal Church Home became Canterbury Place in 1985 and UPMC Canterbury Place in 2007; and,

**Whereas**, UPMC Canterbury Place will celebrate 150 years of service to the neediest members of our community in 2009,
