**WHEREAS**, Florence V. Wasler was born on September 22, 1916, in Charleroi, Pennsylvania, daughter of Lockwood and Rita Hughes. On Thursday, May 14, 2015, at the age of ninety-eight, Florence peacefully went to her eternal rest in heaven, leaving a legacy of love, kindness and care; and,

Howard also served three-terms as a Council Member in Washington, PA. Their successful efforts endured and the floral shop is still in business today.
